Joe Acorn

Joe Acorn has been a member of the NWT Public Utilities Board for 4 years, the Vice-Chair for 2 years and was appointed as the part-time Chair on Jan. 1, 2007. Joe has degrees in chemical and civil engineering and when not working for the PUB, he works as a consultant, primarily representing aboriginal communities before environmental and regulatory bodies.

Arden Berg

Arden Berg was appointed as Board Member for the Alberta Energy and Utilities Board (EUB) in October 1998. Prior to joining the Board, Mr. Berg had over 25 years of experience in Alberta's oil and gas industry, including at the senior management level in development, divestitures, operations, joint ventures, and public and government affairs. He began at Amoco Canada as a production engineer with assignments in several field offices. He progressed through management positions, including Manager, Public and Government Affairs; General Manager, Joint Interest; and General Manager (Conventional), NWBU. He was also Vice President, Resource Development, at Crestar Energy Inc. and Vice President, Business Development, at Gibson Petroleum Company Ltd., and he has been a consultant. As a Board Member, Mr. Berg has been active in a range of issues from sour gas to utility regulation. He has been the Board sponsor of a variety of issues, including flare reduction, ADR, landowner industry relations, application and hearing improvements, electronic filing, and sour gas issues. Sophie Brochu

Sophie Brochu has been working in the energy industry for more than 15 years. She started in 1987 as a Financial Analyst with SOQUIP (Société québécoise d'initiatives pétrolières), where she was appointed Assistant to the President from 1990 to 1992, following which she was promoted Vice President, Development, a position she held until 1997. Madame Brochu then moved to Gaz Métro, the main gas distributor in Québec, as Vice President, Business Development. In 2000, she was given the additional responsibilities of strategic planning and gas supply for Gaz Métro. On February 7, 2007, Sophie Brochu succeeded Robert Tessier as President and Chief Executive Officer of the Company. Madame Brochu is a graduate in economic sciences from the Université Laval à Québec where she specialized in the energy field. She is a member of the Board of Directors of the Institut de réadaptation de Montréal and Société du Musée d'archéologie et d'histoire de Montréal (Pointe-à-Callière). She is actively involved with Muscular Dystrophy Canada and works with children at the École Hochelaga, a school in the Hochelaga-Maisonneuve neighbourhood that is also supported by Gaz Métro.

Karen Campbell

Karen Campbell joined the Pembina Institute in March 2006 to become their first in-house counsel and Director of BC Policy. Karen has extensive experience on upstream oil and gas issues in British Columbia, including strong connections to landowner communities in Western Canada. In addition to oil and gas, Karen's expertise includes many energy issues across BC, such as coalbed methane, coal

fired power and climate change. Prior to joining Pembina, Karen was a staff lawyer at West Coast Environmental Law for 7 years, where she was the primary architect of West Coast's Oil and Gas Program, which focuses on increasing awareness of the upstream impacts from oil, gas and coalbed methane development in BC by working with directly affected communities and local First Nations. Prior to joining CEA in 2000 he was Assistant Deputy Minister (ADM), Energy Sector in the Department of Natural Resources Canada (NRCan), formerly Energy, Mines and Resources (EMR) and before that, Director General of the Energy Policy Branch. From 1987 to January 1990, he was Assistant Director, Resource Policy Division in the Department of Finance. Before joining the federal government in 1987, Mr. Cleland worked in Nova Scotia where he was a principal in the firm of Cleland, Dunsmuir Consulting Ltd., lecturer in business/government relations at the school of Public Administration at Dalhousie University and academic editor of Plan Canada, the journal of the Canadian Institute of Planners. Dennis Fitzgerald

Dennis Fitzgerald is corporate Director of Energy for Catalyst Paper, a leading provider of mechanical printing papers to markets in North America and abroad, and with operations located on the lower coast of British Columbia. Catalyst Paper is a major energy consumer and is BC Hydro's largest customer, primarily to serve its thermo-mechanical pulp making processes. In his capacity he manages the energy portfolio for the company's facilities and serves as the point of contact for energy projects and proposals from outside parties. Dennis has a degree in Electrical Engineering from the University of British Columbia, and began work in 1976 for Crown Zellerbach, a predecessor company to Catalyst. Dennis has served and been active in a number of capacities in industry, professional and community organizations, both locally and nationally. He is registered as a Professional Engineer in BC and served as Chair of the engineering resources board in the Canadian Council of Professional Engineers. Peter W. Gurnham

Peter W. Gurnham, Q.C. was appointed as a Member of the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board on June 5, 2003 and then as Chair on October 23, 2004. Peter holds bachelor's degrees in Arts (Economics) and Law from Dalhousie University in Halifax and was appointed as a Queen's Counsel in 1998. He also had an active municipal and planning law practice. Michael Janigan

Michael Janigan is the Executive Director and General Counsel of the Public Interest Advocacy Centre located in Ottawa, Canada. The Centre provides legal services and research on behalf of Canadian consumers and the organisations that represent them. The work of the Centre primarily involves issues concerned with the delivery of telecommunications, energy, broadcasting, banking, transportation and other important public services. The Centre has been in existence since 1976 and has a small staff of lawyers, researchers and administrative personnel. Mr. Janigan has been the Executive Director of the Centre since 1992. Prior to assuming his current position, Mr. Janigan was a city and regional councillor representing a downtown ward in the City of Ottawa. Steven J. Kean

Steven J. Kean is Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer for Kinder Morgan, Inc. (NYSE: KMI), Kinder Morgan Energy Partners, L.P. (NYSE: KMP) and Kinder Morgan Management, LLC (NYSE: KMR) and a member of the Office of the Chairman. He is responsible for coordinating the company's efforts to achieve operational excellence. He joined the company in January of 2002 as Vice President of Strategic Planning for the Natural Gas Pipeline group. Immediately prior to assuming his current duties, Mr. Kean served as Executive Vice President, Operations and is the former President of KMP's Intrastate Pipeline group, a position from which he led the successful integration of the Tejas and Kinder Morgan Texas natural gas pipeline systems. Mr. Kean has worked in the energy industry for nearly 20 years in various legal, regulatory and commercial positions, primarily in the wholesale energy and pipeline sectors. Before joining Kinder Morgan, he worked for Enron, Utilicorp and El Paso Natural Gas. Mr. Kean holds a bachelor's degree from Iowa State University and a law degree from the University of Iowa. Kinder Morgan, Inc. (NYSE: KMI) is one of the largest energy transportation, storage and distribution companies in North America. It owns an interest in, or operates, approximately 43,000 miles of pipelines that transport primarily natural gas, crude oil, petroleum products and CO₂; more than 150

terminals that store, transfer and handle products like gasoline and coal; and provides natural gas distribution service to over 1.1 million customers. KMI owns the general partner interest of Kinder Morgan Energy Partners (NYSE: KMP), one of the largest publicly traded pipeline limited partnerships in the United States. Combined, the companies have an enterprise value of more than \$35 billion.

Joseph Kelliher

Chairman Joseph Kelliher was nominated by President George W. Bush to a Republican seat on the Commission, and was sworn in on November 20, 2003. He was designated Chairman of the Commission by President Bush, effective July 9, 2005. Before becoming a Commissioner, Mr. Kelliher was Senior Policy Advisor to Secretary of Energy Spencer Abraham. In that capacity, he advised the Secretary on a wide range of energy policy matters. Mr. Kelliher helped develop the National Energy Policy. He had served as Senior Policy Advisor to the Secretary since the inauguration of President George W. Bush. Before joining the Department of Energy, Mr. Kelliher served on the Bush/Cheney Presidential Transition Team. Previously, Mr. Kelliher was of Counsel with the law firm of LeBoeuf, Lamb, Greene & MacRae. He served as Majority Counsel to the House Committee on Commerce from 1995 to 2000, where he was responsible for electricity, hydropower, conservation, nuclear waste, and other energy legislation. During 1991 to 1995, Mr. Kelliher represented Public Service Electric and Gas Company before the Congress on a wide range of energy legislation. In the late 1980s, Mr. Kelliher worked for the American Nuclear Energy Council, where he was responsible for nuclear licensing reform and various regulatory issues. In the mid-1980s, Mr. Kelliher served on the staff of Rep. Joe Barton (R-TX), current chairman of the House Committee on Energy and Commerce. In the early 1980s, Mr. Kelliher worked at the law firm of Preston, Thorgrimson, Ellis & Holman. Mr. Kelliher has worked on energy issues for over 20 years. Mr. Kelliher is married to the former Karen Goff. They have two sons and a daughter.

Len Kelsey

Len Kelsey was appointed Commissioner with the British Columbia Utilities Commission in 2003. His work with the Commission includes regulation of auto insurance rates (ICBC), and electricity and gas regulation. Previously, he held a number of executive positions with the British Columbia Automobile Association, including leading the Insurance Agency and Insurance Corporation. His career includes both local and international work in human resources and operations management. In addition to his business career, Len has always been active in the volunteer community including Board positions at Lions Gate Hospital, Public Administrator and Board Chair of the North Shore Health Region, and Board and

Committee work with professional, educational and community organizations. He currently serves on the Board of the Canadian MedicAlert Foundation, the MedicAlert Foundation International and the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary.

Chris King

Chris King is President, eMeter Strategic Consulting and Chief Strategy Officer of eMeter Corporation, a provider of advanced meter data management and system management software to utilities. His previous experience includes being CEO and founder of Utility.com (a competitive retail electric company), Vice President -Regulatory Affairs, Sales and Marketing for Cellnet (a large smart metering company), and a director of a variety of time-based rates and energy efficiency programs at Pacific Gas & Electric Company in California. A nationally recognized authority on energy regulation and demand response, Mr. King works regularly with regulators and legislators on technology and customer issues in advanced metering demand response; he has testified before state and federal regulators and the U.S. Congress on these matters. Mr. King, who holds a masters degree from the Stanford Graduate School of Business, is a board member of numerous industry organizations providing leadership in smart metering and demand response.

Hal Kvisle

Hal Kvisle is President and Chief Executive Officer of TransCanada Corporation, a leading North American energy company focused on natural gas transmission and power generation. He joined TransCanada in 1999 as Executive Vice-President, Trading and Business Development and was appointed to his current position in April 2001. Mr. Kvisle is on the Board of Directors for TransCanada Corporation, PrimeWest Energy Inc., Bank of Montreal and is Chair of the Board of Governors, Mount Royal College. He was the 2004 Chairman of the Board of the Interstate Natural Gas Association of America. Mr. Kvisle holds an MBA from the University of Calgary and a B.Sc. (Eng.) from the University of Alberta. Prior to joining TransCanada, he was employed by Fletcher Challenge Energy and Dome Petroleum.

Gord Lambert

Gord Lambert is Vice President, Sustainable Development for Suncor Energy. In this role, Gord directs Suncor's environment, health and safety policies and works with senior management and external stakeholders to align and improve the company's long-term financial, social and environmental performance. Prior to assuming this role in July 1997, Gord spent two years as Director, Sustainable Development for TransAlta Corporation and 15 years with a major Canadian integrated oil and gas

Neil McCrank retired on March 31, 2007 as Chairman of the Alberta Energy and Utilities Board (EUB), after nearly nine years with the EUB, and a total of thirty-four years of public service in Alberta and Ontario. Neil McCrank was appointed Chairman of the EUB in July 1998. The Chairman is responsible for directing and coordinating the EUB's regulatory mandate governing energy resource development and utility matters in Alberta. After coming to Alberta in 1979 to work with the Alberta Attorney General, he served as a Special Prosecutor, Assistant Deputy Minister for the Criminal Justice Division, Deputy Attorney General, and Deputy Minister for the Alberta Department of Justice until his appointment to the EUB. Prior to his public service career in Alberta, Mr. McCrank worked with the Province of Ontario and spent several years with a private law firm in Toronto. A native of Val d'Or, Québec, Mr. McCrank received his Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering from Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario. Law Society of Upper Canada, the Canadian and Calgary Bar Associations, and the Association of Professional Engineers, Geologists and Geophysicists of Alberta. Mr. McCrank has served on numerous national commissions, steering committees, task forces, and review panels related to emerging legal issues. Mr. McCrank is an active community volunteer and is currently serving as Vice-Chairman of the World Petroleum Congresses Canadian Association, Chairman of the Canadian Energy Research Institute, member of the Institute for Sustainable Energy, Environment and Economy Leadership Board at the University of Calgary, Executive Member of the Van Horne Institute, Board Member of Catholic Charities, and Board Member of the Calgary YMCA.

He is a past director of the Vancouver Board of Trade and AceTech. Mulji holds a Bachelors Degree in Electrical Engineering from the University of British Columbia and is a registered Professional Engineer.

Dave Nevius

Dave Nevius is Senior Vice President and Director of Reliability Assessment and Performance Analysis of the North American Electric Reliability Corporation (NERC), located in Princeton, New Jersey. NERC's mission is to ensure that the bulk electric system in North America is reliable, adequate and secure. Established in 1968, NERC develops and enforces reliability standards; monitors the bulk power system; assesses future adequacy; audits owners, operators, and users for preparedness; and educates and trains industry personnel. In July 2006, NERC was certified by the U.S. Federal Energy Regulatory Commission as the Electric Reliability Organization for the United States. NERC is working to gain similar recognition by governmental authorities in Canada and Mexico. Since joining NERC in 1977, Mr. Nevius has been involved in all aspects of NERC's reliability activities as well as NERC's efforts to transition into an industry self-regulatory organization. He currently leads the Reliability Assessment and Performance Analysis Program with support from three group leaders in the areas of reliability assessment, events analysis and information exchange, and reliability metrics. Prior to joining NERC, Mr. Nevius was employed by Public Service Electric and Gas Company with responsibilities for transmission expansion planning. He holds a B.S. in Electrical Engineering and a Masters in Engineering Management from Drexel University. He is a registered professional engineer in the state of New Jersey.

Pamela Nowina

Pamela Nowina was appointed Vice-Chair of the Ontario Energy Board in July 2005, and a full-time member of the Ontario Energy Board in March 2004. His column appears on The Sun's editorial pages five days a week and "sometimes that's not often enough to keep up with the pace of news in this province." He also writes a twice-monthly column for The National Post, is a political commentator for Global Television, and hosts Voice of BC, a weekly interview program on Rogers Television. Vaughn has covered eight premiers (and counting) and a surprising range of issues, personalities and scandals in BC's volatile political scene. In 1998, Palmer won the Hyman Solomon Award for excellence in public policy journalism, presented by the Public Policy Forum. Palmer is also the co-recipient of the 1988 Jack Webster Award for reporting. One of the most rewarding aspects of the Victoria posting, he says, was the opportunity to get to know The Sun's late editor emeritus, Bruce Hutchison. Prior to Hutchison's death in 1992, Palmer edited an anthology of his work: *To Canada With Love and Some Misgivings: The Best of Bruce Hutchison*. (Douglas & McIntyre, 1991). Vaughn Palmer was born in 1952 in a small English community near Gaspé, Québec. He moved to British Columbia in 1967 with his parents. He finished high school in Nanaimo (where he never once played bingo) and attended the University of BC, where he worked on the student newspaper, *The Ubysey*. Palmer is married to Dale Ketcheson, a landscape painter. They have one daughter, Elise.

Jane Peverett

Jane Peverett is the President and CEO of BC Transmission Corporation, a crown corporation responsible for managing the electricity transmission in B.C. Before joining BCTC, Jane was President and CEO of Union Gas. Jane currently serves on the boards of: EnCana Corporation, the Canadian Electricity Association; the University of Victoria; the Business Council of BC; the United Way of the Lower Mainland Campaign Cabinet and is a member of the Senate of the Stratford Festival of Canada. Jane was made a Fellow of the Society of Management Accountants in 2003 and has been named one of the 50 Key Women in Energy in the world.
